


Figure 7: Sorry, *no horses will be served* at the Hacienda Turner Bar, as per local ordnance No. 5387-2.




Figure 8: Last year's Eskimo Wrestling Champion "Six Fingers" Ferguson celebrating his win over "Dirty Dan" Duncan.




Figure 10: Greater Los Angeles, with event locations numbered.




Figure 11: Humorous comment on limited "lodging" during the 1859 Comstock Silver Rush from California to Nevada, by J. Ross Browne.

# *Tips for the Out-of-Town Visitor:*

**Internet Previews:** Please "Google" Internet entries for San Fernando Mission, The Autry Museum and Bob's Big Boy Burgers in the months, weeks and days before you venture to Los Angeles, as well as those of any other local attractions you would like to visit. Please also make your lodging arrangements **well in advance**.

*Flying in and Out:* If you can, fly into Burbank Airport, **not** LAX. Burbank is small, convenient, and close to all of our events. Car rental is a snap.


**Rush Hour Traffic:** There no longer is a "rush hour" in Los Angeles. Traffic jams can come at any time of the day or night, weekdays or weekends, especially since much road work (necessitating road or lane closures) is scheduled during "non-commute" hours (like, at 10 PM on Saturday Night). So you should build-in extra time to spend sitting on the freeway, motionless, studying the tail lights in front of you.

**Parking:** Is the No. 1 headache in metropolitan Los Angeles. Parking lots are few and far between, and rates can be exorbitant. Street parking is often only of short duration, and your car may be ticketed or towed unless you "feed the meter." Some meters only take credit cards; many are broken and do not function.

Also, check the signs for which day of the week the putative street-sweeper is scheduled to come by, and when. In many parts of L.A. parking is free 6 days a week, but you will be ticketed on "street sweeper day" if you park during certain hours, even if the street has not been swept for decades, nor is likely to be swept for many years to come.

Parking in the **San Fernando Mission** lot is limited, but can be found on the street on both **San Fernando Mission Blvd** at a short distance to both west and east, and along both sides of **Brand Boulevard** one block to the south. Additional spaces can be found up and down **Sepulveda Blvd** two blocks to the west. Parking at the **Autry Museum** is free, and the lot (shared with the Zoo and other Griffith Park attractions) is one of the largest in Los Angeles.

**Cautions:** Visitors to L.A. are more likely to be ticketed for driving *too slow* than *too fast.* Stay out of the fast lane on the freeway unless you intend to exceed the speed limit, otherwise you may be rear-ended. And, if you suspect that the giant pile of rubbish on the sidewalk where you were

thinking of parking may have human occupants, it probably does. L.A. has the largest and most aggressive homeless population in the country, thanks to the practice in all of those little states east of Nevada of handing their indigent citizens one-way bus tickets to Los Angeles. Don't park next to a homeless encampment; you may find squatters *in* or *on* your car upon your return if you do.

**COVID-19:** All local and state authorities at present (April, 2021) predict that by the time of our joint celebration in early October, Southern California should no longer have restrictions on gatherings, dining, lodging, etc. Please **get your vaccinations l**ong before October, 2021. In case of unforeseen COVID-related cancellations, refunds will be made.
